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INTRODUCTION

In accordance with the requirements of California Public Utilities Code Division 4, Chapter 7, Article 5 (Women, Minority, Disabled Veteran, and LGBT Business Enterprises (§§ 8281 — 8286) and the California Public Utilities Commission's implementing regulations assembled in General Order 156, Verizon hereby submits the attached Annual Report that covers supplier activities and results from January 1, 2024 – December 31, 2024 for the Goals set by the CPUC and our 2024 Annual Plan.

INTERNAL PROGRAM STRATEGIES AND ACTIVITIES

Responsible Business: We're on a mission to help solve some of the biggest challenges the world faces today by leveraging our technology, innovation and people:

- Verizon Skill Forward provides skills to help program participants pave new career opportunities with job-relevant programs from EdX and is part of Verizon's goal to make quality education accessible for all. There are more than 250 courses spanning 84 unique professional certificate programs across in-demand areas of Al, business coding, communication, finance IT and more. Verizon offers access to a suite of edX development and exploration tools including career tips, resources, job board and industry related events and workshops.
- Verizon's Small Business Digital Ready provides small businesses with free on-line courses, tools, coaching, peer networking and access to grants where small businesses can apply for funding to take their business to the next level. There are over 64,000 small businesses in California registered in the Small Business Digital Ready program, over 25,000 registered in 2024 alone. Participants who register and complete two courses or mentoring events are eligible to apply for grant funding exclusive to users of Small Business Digital Ready. Our grants are in the range of \$10,000 and are for those small businesses that can use additional sources of funding. Many of these grants are provided to diverse businesses. In California, for 2024, 65% of the small business grant awardees were people of color; 9% LGBT, 17% disability-owned 4% veteran and 57% of total grantees were women, and there are over 64,000 small businesses in California registered in the Small Business Digital Ready program, over 25,000 registered in 2024 alone.
