
Establishing Resource Adequacy Requirements

The Resource Adequacy Program:

- Implemented in 2006
- Includes System, Local and Flexible Requirements

Goals:

- Ensure safe and reliability operation of the grid in real time by requiring sufficient resources are provided to the CAISO when and where needed
- Incentivize siting and construction of new resources needed for future grid reliability





The 2025 Resource Adequacy OIR

This rulemaking continues the California Public Utilities Commission's oversight of the Resource Adequacy (RA) program, establishes forward RA procurement obligations applicable to load-serving entities beginning with the 2027 compliance year, and considers structural reforms and refinement to the program.

Preliminary Scope includes the following:
